Grand Avenue Working Group Meets with City Leaders, Proposes Community-Driven Partnership



In mid-2023, SHA partnered with the Grand Avenue Business Association to set up the Grand Avenue Working Group, charged with working on projects to revitalize Grand Avenue. As a series of high profile closures made headlines over the holidays, our group was already working on solutions. Its membership grew to over 40 as community volunteers, business leaders, real estate brokers, developers, and others came forward to help, and we defined 5 key strategic anchors.

We knew we needed the City's support and partnership to be successful. In January, SHA and GABA co-signed a letter to City leaders to request an urgent meeting. In late February, we met with Mayor Carter, Director of Planning Nicolle Goodman, Director of Community Initiatives Noel Nix, and Ward 2 Council Member and Rebecca Noecker to discuss the issues Grand Avenue is facing and potential solutions and next steps.

City leaders were excited about the group's work and want to see Grand Avenue back to its best. We agreed to identify initial projects for Grand Avenue where the City could help, conduct more outreach to Grand Avenue businesses and the surrounding communities, and to work with them to

engage STRS Ohio, with the goal of helping them fill the high-profile vacancies in their buildings. All of this work will be underpinned by a corridor-wide vision for Grand Avenue, which businesses and the community will help define.

We also shared insights from the group's work to date, including from our business listening session on 2/20/24 that was attended by more than 20 Grand Avenue business owners. Businesses highlighted the need for better maintenance, physical infrastructure improvements and placemaking, events and promotion, as well as finding ways to help businesses mitigate higher taxes, assessments, and rent increases.

This meeting would not have been successful without the efforts of our volunteer-led Working Group. There's plenty of work still ahead of us, but our community-led partnership model is already proving its value. We're looking forward to working with GABA to restore Grand Avenue's status as Saint Paul's destination main street, including a pleasant, safe, walkable streetscape, engaging events throughout the year, and interesting and unique places to eat, shop, hang out and play.

Working Group Strategies:

- 1. Fill existing vacancies, especially the long-term vacancies. This includes building vacancies attributable to the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio.
- 2. Improve the built environment. This includes cosmetic updates to the avenue, making Grand Avenue a more attractive place to explore.
- 3. Bring more communityoriented programming and events to Grand Avenue.
- 4. Highlight and promote existing businesses on Grand Avenue.
- 5. Establish partnerships, funding, and regulatory changes to help Grand Avenue respond to a changing retail environment.

Announcing major developments for the Reimagine Linwood Park project!

First, the City of Saint Paul approved its list of projects slated for improvement thanks to the recently approved 1% sales tax increase. Linwood Community Center will receive over \$1 million in these funds!

This \$1 million is in addition to dollars already committed by nonprofit partner KABOOM!*. City of Saint Paul Parks and Recreation recently shared with SHA that first phase investments will be as follows:

- \$400,000 to replace the 30-year old playground. (This funding will also come from the non-profit KABOOM!* and the St. Paul Parks Conservancy.**)
- \$375,000 for pre-design work for the lower field.
- \$192,000 for the retaining wall between the playground and the sidewalk on the south side of St. Clair Ave.
- \$78,000 to replace the fire alarm system within the recreation center.
- \$75,000 for sidewalk and asphalt repairs within the footprint of the entire Linwood campus.

We anticipate that KABOOM! will be working toward a fall 2024 installation for the playground. SHA will be coordinating with KABOOM! to ensure that our community has input on playground design.

But what about the rest of the park?

These investments represent the first phase of the Linwood campus overhaul. SHA will continue to work with city staff and our community on the entire projects - from possible bandshell or amphitheater to a splash pad, pickleball courts, and more.

You will soon see SHA launch a capital campaign to position us to engage the community and philanthropic partners in this work. Whether you are able to donate your time, talent, or dollars, we welcome you to this work and are excited about the next few years at Linwood!

What's next?

Over the course of the next few months, SHA will be asking for your help. This is likely to be in three ways:

Your time: We will need help assembling the KABOOM! playground equipment to replace the existing playground. We are hoping this can be a one-day, all-hands-on-deck project for neighbors.

Your support: Ensuring that this first phase is the launching point for a full transformation of Linwood Park means that SHA will be embarking on a capital campaign to raise money for projects where public and philanthropic dollars fall short.

Your voice: This is a significant undertaking for SHA. Not only do we need your ideas on the future of Linwood,

we need you to share the great news with your friends, family, and neighbors.

It's a genuinely exciting time for our neighborhood.

A year ago, we started rebuilding the Summit Hill Association (SHA) to make a meaningful impact in our community. We oriented our work around three goals - rebuilding Linwood Park, revitalizing Grand Avenue, and creating a stronger community.

A year later, we're delivering on that promise. As I write this, the City Council has just approved over \$1.1M towards Phase I of rebuilding the park at Linwood Rec Center. A new playspace

for our community is slated to be built this fall! Improvements to the rest of the park will be studied this year for implementation next year and beyond. This is a generational investment in our recreational amenities and an incredible outcome for our community. It will help reestablish Linwood Park as our community's gathering place for decades to come, as well as drawing new visitors and residents to Summit Hill. It's exciting and inspiring in equal measure. And it's happening because a group of neighbors came together through SHA a year ago and dared to believe it was possible. Over the past year, we conducted extensive community engagement, activated Linwood Park through community events, and forged strong partnerships with Parks & Rec, KABOOM! and the Saint Paul Parks Conservancy. All of which helped turn an idea into reality.

Similarly, when we saw the warning signs for Grand Avenue last year, we sprang into action. We used every channel and resource we had to put out a call for volunteers to step up and help. We partnered with the business association and other stakeholders. Our Grand Avenue Working Group now numbers over 40 community volunteers and stakeholders. You can read about our progress in this newsletter. Our approach to commercial corridor revitalization puts business and community at the heart of the process. We're working closely with City leadership on everything from street activation to infrastructure improvements and small business assistance. If this approach works for Grand Avenue, it could be a model for every commercial corridor in the City.

These are just two examples of what SHA is already achieving in Summit Hill and beyond. I haven't even mentioned all the other work we do throughout the year -Spring Cleanup, Parents' Group, Summer concerts, zoning applications and city studies, amongst other things.

But how is an organization like ours able to have this kind of seismic local impact? What's the secret? In a word: partnerships. As a District Council, we're uniquely placed to leverage our connections to the City, other groups, and the broader community - the families, renters, business owners, employees, and others who live here or whose lives intersect with our neighborhood - to deliver real change for Summit Hill. We're at our best when we're a conduit through which the community's ideas take shape and are made real. And by inviting the entire community into our work, we're able to multiply our impact many, many times over.

This is only possible when neighbors step up and participate. To that end, we've welcomed 7 new board members and over 30 new volunteers to work on our Grand Avenue and Linwood Park projects in less than 3 months. We'd love to have you join them and help contribute directly to building your community. Consider serving on our board. Volunteer to help organize events, plan engagement, or help us deliver a successful House Tour. Or have your organization advertise with us or sponsor our work. If nothing else, make a regular donation to directly support the impact we're making in Summit Hill and beyond.

Now is an incredibly exciting time to get involved. It's a once in a generation opportunity to make a lasting contribution to our neighborhood and help write Summit Hill's next chapter. I'll promise you one thing above all else: it's some of the most rewarding work you'll ever do.

The district council system in Saint Paul is comprised of 17 autonomous 501(c)(3) non-profit agencies that provide residents in each neighborhood an opportunity to become involved in city planning. The primary focus of most district councils is land use, community development and transportation. Other issues that district councils may focus on include parks and recreation centers, community gardens, environmental action, crime prevention and neighborhood beautification.
